GMSVP once again will have a booth at the TOTE Show being held at the Virginia Beach Convention Center on July 19-21. GMSVP's booth will have displays to educate the public about Virginia's natural resources and our club. Members also display their collections and demonstrate the equipment. As a fund raising activity, our club sells geodes at the show, which we cut with our rock saws. These shows also are a great way to increase awareness of our club, get to know other members, and gain new club members.

Any of our members may use the club's equipment during the show. All they have to do is sign up to reserve a time. While the equipment can be used without a reservation, those signed up will have first preference. Members will be available to provide training on the equipment's proper use and safety for new rockhounds. We encourage our volunteers to also see the show vendor booths.

HELP NEEDED:

Please volunteer to help!

• Thursday, July 18th:

- ◇ **Noon:** Volunteers should meet at our club shed at the Sandy Bottom Nature Park (*enter from Big Bethel Road and turn right at the sign saying "Authorized Vehicles Only"*) at noon to load the truck and caravan over to the show site (or can meet us at the Virginia Beach Convention Center at 1:30 - 2 PM).
- ◇ **~1:30 to 2 PM:** Truck unloading and GMSVP booth/equipment setup at the Virginia Beach Convention Center. Booth and equipment setup takes about 3 hours; more volunteers, less time.



- **Friday, July 19th to Sunday, July 21st:** During the show, GMSVP booth/equipment will have four areas that need manning: demonstrations, education/youth programs, geode sales, and geode/slab cutting.

• Sunday, July 21st:

- ◇ Booth and equipment cleanup, teardown, and truck loading at the end of the show.
- ◇ Truck unloading at the club's shed in Sandy Bottom Nature Park in Hampton.

Editor's Note: As you know, we get most of our club revenue from selling and cutting geodes during the Treasures of the Earth (TOTE) Shows. Our success depends upon our club members being willing to volunteer their time to staff the booth and large rock saws. One of our newer members, Celeste Small, has helped cut geodes during the last couple of shows. The article below shares Celeste's experience.

Rocks are magic. All of them. While not everyone may be as fascinated as I am by the geology of rock formations, everyone seems to recognize the magic of geodes. From small children to adults, everyone seems to feel the lure of these roundish, mostly plain looking rocks that may not be heavy as they look and hold the promise of tiny glittering caverns inside. That makes geodes the perfect way to share the magic of rocks with other people.

I get to share that magic with dozens of people every day when I work the geode cutting side of our booth at the local TOTE shows. Hundreds of people purchase geodes from our club over the course of the weekend, and the cutting team gets to share that first moment of anticipation and wonder as they open a geode millions of years old for the first time. This means that I get to see hundreds of beautiful,



minuscule crystal caves exposed to the light for the very first time and share the wonder of it with whoever is going to be taking that geode home.....and all I have to do is be willing to work the saw.

Cutting geodes also means I get lots of experience working with the larger lapidary saws. I get to help set up the saws, learn how to troubleshoot them when they act funny, adjust them to get the cut that I want on uniquely shaped stones, and clean them properly when at the end of the show. This is invaluable to me as I explore the various aspects of the lapidary world, decide what parts of it really appeal to me, and which ones I can realistically engage in. I already know that I love cutting rocks, but I'm still working out how best to



engage in this pursuit for myself. Learning from our experienced club members how to operate large rock saws and being able to get hours of hands-on experience is a pretty spectacular benefit of being part of this club and rockhound community.

Whether you're drawn to the idea of getting experience on the equipment, the looks on the kids' faces when they open a sparkly geode for the first time, or just the sheer joy of cutting rocks with other people who get it, I hope you'll consider coming out to the July 19th - 21st TOTE Show and cutting a few geodes with us. I recommend that you wear some old clothes, safety glasses, and an apron, if you have it. The club provides earplugs and face masks. There will be plenty of club members that will be happy to help get you started and lots of geodes for you to cut. You can also bring some material of your own to cut, when it's not busy.


NEW MELTING DISH

A new melting dish or crucible must be given a protective coating of borax before its first use. Borax extends the life of the ceramic material. Once done, it generally does not have to be repeated.

The procedure is straightforward. Heat the new melting dish to red with a large torch. You'll need plenty of heat. I use an acetylene/air Prest-O-Lite torch with a large #5 nozzle.

When the dish is hot, sprinkle in a half teaspoon of borax, let it melt, and spread it with a carbon rod over all of the interior surface of the dish. Add more borax if needed.

Sometimes you will have to hold the dish at an angle to coat the sides up to the rim. And don't forget to coat the pouring spout itself.




RING SIZE VARIATIONS

The numerical sizes marked on ring gauges and ring mandrels are often not the same across different manufacturers. If you're using a ring gauge to measure a customer, be sure to compare the markings on the gauge with the markings on the mandrel you use to make the ring. They may not be the same.

Also, you may have to adjust a little for the width of the ring shank. If you're making a wide shank ring, the ring generally has to be a little bit larger in diameter than the ring gauge size in order to get a comfortable fit.

Wildacres.....Finally!

I have been a member of several EFMLS clubs for over 20 years. During that time, I have frequently heard reports from other members about the great experiences that they had at EFMLS workshops held at the Wildacres retreat in Little Switzerland, North Carolina. I had often thought that I should attend one of those workshops and find out for myself if they are as wonderful as my friends indicate, but I never could seem to find the time. I recently retired, though, and now find myself with more time to devote to rock collecting and lapidary work, so I resolved to attend a workshop in May 2019.



Wildacres is located in the mountains of western North Carolina, which I consider some of the most beautiful land in the country. EFMLS sponsors two sessions each year, in May and September. Wildacres also hosts many workshops sponsored by other non-profit organizations, including crafts, music, writing, and others. For general information on Wildacres, one can visit their website, wildacres.org. EFMLS workshops offer classes on a wide variety of lapidary and jewelry making arts, as well as geology. For more details about EFMLS workshops, including upcoming classes and application forms, see the website efmls-wildacres.org. Also check out the article about Wildacres by Helen Serras-Herman in the April 2019 issue of Rock and Gem magazine.

To say that Wildacres is a secluded spot would be the understatement of the year. The nearest town of any size, Spruce Pine, is about 30 minutes away. There is no television. There is almost no cell phone reception, and very limited internet. At night, the loudest noise one is likely to hear is the call of a whip-poor-will. If nothing else, it is a great place to unplug, unwind, and recharge. The facilities exceeded my expectations. The lodges, dining hall, meeting rooms, and classrooms are all very nice. I was expecting something much more rustic. Also exceeding my expectations were the three square meals a day that we were served.



Classes in EFMLS workshops are organized into two 2-day “semesters” with a free day in between. Some classes run for both semesters; others, for only one. All are taught by highly skilled, generous, and patient instructors from EFMLS clubs. Interspersed with the classes are several lectures by a “Speaker in Residence”, who is always a person well known in the field of gems, jewelry, and/or minerals. When I was there, it was noted gemologist and author Renée Newman. Past speakers have included Fred Ward, Mike Wise, Bob Jones and Helen Serras-Herman. The free day is particularly fun. Weather permitting, there is a field trip to a local collecting site, which I especially enjoyed. Or, one can go to some of the many points of interest in the area, visit local rock shops, or just relax. Later in the afternoon, there is a tailgate show, during which people can sell or trade rocks, jewelry, and related items. Another particularly fun event is the “Good Stuff Auction” held one evening, in which donated items are sold to help support the EFLMS Wildacres workshop. The last night of the workshop, everyone gathers to show off what they have made during the week. Finally, everyone adjourns to the canteen for one last party.



So, is Wildacres all it's cracked up to be? In a word, “Yes”! I had a great time, learned a lot, got a few new rocks, and made a lot of new friends. And, yes, I will be going back.



Although the fossil hunting at the Belgrade Quarry has passed, there is still an opportunity to participate in the public fossil hunt at the Belgrade and Onslow Quarries of Martin Marietta in North Carolina. The Martin Marietta corporation has been very gracious in letting the public hunt for fossils at their quarry. It is a great location to find shark's teeth, fossil sand dollars and urchins, and the occasional nautiloid. They are both fossil marine environments and are very similar to the famous Aurora material (which is only about 45 minutes away) Megalodon teeth, as well as fossil mammal bones, have been found, but are rare.

The dig dates are always on a Friday, and it's roughly a four hour drive from the peninsula. You need to be at the location before 8 AM for the mandatory safety briefing, so you either need to be on the road by about 4 AM or start your journey the night before and get a place to stay. The safety briefing involves watching a film, getting briefed on the particular mine, regulations, and waiver signing. I shouldn't need to remind folks that it's been getting harder and harder to get into quarries these days and this is a fantastic opportunity, so be sure to LISTEN and OBEY all rules given at the safety briefing.

Required Safety gear is: Steel-toed or ANSI equivalent boots, long pants, safety glasses, hard hat, and a high visibility safety vest (preferably red/orange.)

Recommended gear: Sun screen(!), bug spray, WATER(!) as it's going to be VERY HOT, food, buckets. You might want to pack some rags and old towels as it can get quite muddy there (like the last two trips I went to).


The Onslow consist of mostly transported overburden and loose sand and dirt. Surface looking is recommended and has been quite productive. Hammers and chisels might be needed, but unlikely. I've seen people dig and sift with some luck but that seems like too much work for me. You're free to try it, if you like.

The Belgrade quarry hasn't been hunted for about a year as it's been underwater since last year's hurricane.

16th Annual Western North Carolina Rockhound Roundup on July 21st - 28th

The largest annual Rockhound gathering in the state!

This event will be based at Camp Stephens. This property is located just outside the city of Asheville off of Interstate 26. The camp is just 3.5 miles from the Interstate but located in a secluded wooded area on the French Broad River. There is room for many RV's and tent campers. There is a large indoor pavilion with two bathrooms, two showers (note that the showers and bathrooms have been renovated and are in excellent working condition now) a kitchen, electricity and water for the outside campers and inside the pavilion. There are large campfire pits for use by campers. I will also have two 'porta potties' on site for extra bathrooms. There will be a dumpster on site for all garbage (be sure to bag your garbage before putting it in the dumpster). Campers will be able to swim, fish, canoe, snorkel, etc. in the river. The camp area is completely wooded so there is plenty of shade. We will be allowed to use the numerous tables provided in the pavilion to set up and swap/sale our rocks and minerals. Three miles from the camp are numerous gas stations, a mall, restaurants, motels/hotels and more.

Campers can arrive anytime Sunday the 21st to set up camp and get ready for the week's events.

Agenda: We have coordinated this event to coincide with the numerous gem and mineral shows that are taking place in Franklin, North Carolina the same week. We will visit a variety of mines for collecting. There will be directions to the mines given to all attendees, campers, and participants, and they can visit any of the mines listed here, any day of the roundup as many times as they like. I will have release forms and take payment for some mines at the camp and will provide instructions as to where to pay for some mines.

Mines we will have full access to during the week of the roundup:

Crabtree Emerald Mine in Mitchell County, NC. Fee: \$15 for those camping at the roundup, \$20 for all others. Release forms and payment will be collected at the camp prior to the dig. Directions will be provided at camp.

Sinkhole Mine in Mitchell County, NC. No fee, directions will be provided at camp.

Little Pine Garnet Mine in Madison County, NC. Fee: \$25 per person. Forms and payment are handled at the office of the Sandy Bottom Trail Rides before proceeding to the mine. Directions will be provided at camp.

Sharpes Emerald Prospect in Hiddenite, NC. Fee \$20 for those camping at the roundup, \$25 for all others. Release forms and payment will be collected at the camp prior to the dig. Directions will be provided at camp.

We will be visiting the numerous gem and mineral shows in Franklin, NC daily.

There will be demonstrations on wire wrap, flint knapping, cabochon making, etc. Display tables will be available to show off your favorite specimens. The members have a cookout in the evening and a big campfire. There will be tables setup throughout the week for people to sell and trade their rocks and minerals, gems and jewelry.

Saturday the 27th; THE FEAST! Everyone should bring a dish or desert and something to drink. If you need to cook something for the meal, you should start cooking around 1 PM to be ready to eat around 3 PM.

Fee for Roundup: \$40 per person. Vendors, \$60. This covers all 7 days of the Roundup.

Kids 12 and under are free.

If you plan to only attend a few of the days, the cost will be \$10 per day.

Directions: Take exit 33 off of Interstate 26 just outside of Asheville NC. Go west on Brevard Road/Hwy. 191. Drive 3.5 miles to Clayton Road on the left, turn left and drive 2/10ths of a mile to the entrance to Camp Stephens on the left. You will see a large MAGMA sign at the entrance. I will to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind - fences, signs, buildings.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires in designated or safe places only and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks or other water supply.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
